In his closing remarks, Fr Terence challenges us to be ready all the time. And that in order to do that, we have to be hungry. To be curious. I came away from the conference realising that no matter what the world throws at us – at work, at home, in ministry – as long as we remain faithful to our heavenly Father, HE is the one who will answer all our questions and quell all doubts we have about our abilities to be His instruments on this earth.

And because He has created us in His image, each of us unique in our own way, there is no point comparing myself to others because that is not God's plan for me. To be an effective Catholyst, I have to learn how to discern what God wants for me to do in His vineyard, and to then focus my energies there. Granted, it may take a bit of trail and error, stumbling along from one situation to another; but He will always send people my way to guide, correct, cajole, encourage and affirm. So being a Catholyst requires a period of discernment and acceptance, then a time of action and realisation.

Are we all ready to go out, be curious and help others satisfy their curiosity about our religion? Or are we still asking ourselves, "Huh? Sure or not?"
